1. What breed do you work with..??.. How long..??..

I have always shown HHPs. I LOVE showing in these classes. Showing in HHPs has given me exposure to many breeds over the years and I have had the opportunity to learn quite a bit about all breeds. Showing HHPs is a great way to learn about breeds and meet breeders. You can make decisions about breeds you may want to work with. Over the years I have also had a Somali and have had the opportunity to help groom/show Tonkinese and Exotic Shorthairs in particular.

2. If you could, what other breed of cat would you like to work with..??..

Oh, I would love to have another British. There are many breeds I love. My new husband and I have decided that breeding may not be the best idea for us. We do take in rescues and place them and this alone is really tough. Meet The Breed

The Devon Rex

General Description

Devon Rex are the pixies of the cat fancy with their impish looks and mischievous personalities. The Devon Rex have large low set ears and big impish eyes set in a head with a short muzzle and high cheekbones. It is a small to medium sized cat with a muscular body covered with a short, velvety soft coat that ripples with waves. They are often described as resembling the Gremlins from the film Star Wars while the waif-like tousled curls of their coats are reminiscent of Little Orphan Annie's tousled mop.

History

Buckfastleigh, Devon, England is the ancestral home of the Devon Rex where a feral tom cat with a curly coat lived in an abandoned tin mine. In 1960, a tortie & white stray adopted by Miss Beryl Cox had a litter of kittens sired by the feral tom. One of the kittens was a brownish-black male with a coat just like his sire's. Miss Cox kept the kitten and named him Kirlee. Aware of Kallibunker (the first Cornish Rex) and the work to preserve that new gene, she wrote to Brian Sterling-Webb thinking her Kirlee could contribute to that program. However it turned out that the gene creating Kirlee's curly coat was different to the one producing Kallibunker's marcelled waves. There were a number of differences in the coat between Kirlee and the CR. While Kalli had whiskers that were bent and curled, the gene from Devon resulted in missing or stubby whiskers. Kirlee had tight curls but not as uniform as those of Kallibunker giving them a windblown appearance. And Kirlee had huge, low-set ears giving his head a pixie-like look that was accentuated by the large, inquisitive eyes and short nose. Breeders started developing a program to conserve the gene discovered in Devon too. The gene discovered in Cornwall was designated Gene 1 and that discovered in Devon Gene 2. Sterling-Webb (Briarry) now worked to conserve this gene as well along with Mrs. Agnes Watts (Du-Bu) and Mrs. Madge Shrouder (Hassan). All Devon Rex trace their ancestry back to Kirlee who was sadly killed in a car accident in 1970.

Personality

Devon Rex are intelligent, mischievous and highly active. They are very playful and want to be involved in everything - and they are powerful jumpers no spot goes unexplored! Expect to find them perching on the top of doors or climbing to some previously unexplored spot. Although they are interested in everything going on around them, Devons are very people-oriented and prefer to share their investigations with you so expect their company no matter what you are doing. They will perch on your shoulder watching you make supper (food is another of their favorite things!), curl in your lap while you read a book, and snuggle under the covers to sleep with you at night. They aren't particularly talkative but do chirp when they feel they absolutely need you to look at something that has caught their interest.

Traits

Devon Rex are well-muscled, mid-sized cats weighing on average from six to nine pounds, with males being heavier than females. Their soft, short, curly coats vary from cat to cat - the ideal show coat is an even, full coat of loose curls but individual cats will have coats ranging from a tousled mop of curls to a thin suede-like coat. Some cats may also have almost bare patches as well. The coats often vary over the life of the cat and when molting the coat will often break off so no curl is apparent until the new coat grows back. Kittens often go through this stage. The whiskers and eyebrows are also short and crinkled like the coat.

No matter what we do to prepare ourselves for the death of a beloved pet, even if we knew it was coming, the heart still breaks when that final moment arrives. If you have ever experienced the intense pain of losing one of your furry friends, then you will relate to this column. Our animals do not live long enough and I am sure that all of my readers will agree on that!

My 13 year old red tabby lies with me as I type this column. His breathing is labored because of the lung cancer, but he continues to purr. We talk about what a wonderful cat he has been and how he came to us. He was the littlest kitten with huge ears sitting in a box at the vet's office waiting for his first shot. I remember my daughter looking at me with those pleading eyes and saying, "But mommy, we don't have an orange cat." She was right, so of course we had to bring him home right then and there. The woman who brought him in was a volunteer for a rescue group (this was in my pre rescue days) and, in fact, she became a very close friend and now sits on the Board of Helping Paws.

We brought the little guy home and he immediately took over the house like gang busters. His name jumped out at us – Capone! He was always sweet and affectionate and a little shy with people. As he grew to be 17 pounds, his name was shortened to Pony. He is now at the end of the winter of his life. I know he is going to leave us very soon – but I will still be surprised when he is gone. The years we have shared together will always be a part of my family. I do know that the painful memories will become comforting, as with the loss of any family member.

So when you lose a pet, allow yourself to mourn, much as you would mourn the death of a person. Some people who are grieving the loss of a long-time animal companion may find that the grieving is even worse than that of losing a human being. And if friends and family do not understand your grief, it somehow minimizes the loss and intensifies the feelings of being alone. So do not allow your family and friends who have never experienced a strong bond with a pet, minimize your pain. Seek out the comfort of people who understand. Grief, like death, affects us all, no matter who we are. And if you do not have anyone who you can share your feelings with, feel free to write to me, as I will always understand.

There are generally five stages of grief and mourning, beginning with denial. This is our built in defense

mechanism that allows us to forget the truth of the death for awhile. Although it is only the beginning, and only a temporary response, it helps us begin the grieving process.

With acceptance, comes anger. It may be directed at God, at our vet, at our pet or even ourselves. We don't really know why we are angry, but it is good to get that anger out of you. And then comes what I think is the worst stage – guilt. We start with the what ifs. What if we had seen that something was wrong sooner. What if we had gotten a second opinion. What if we hadn't made the choices we made? The blame has to go somewhere – and we have to work it through because we are now suffering the intense pain of reality.

Depression – It manifests itself in different ways – some people become silent. The majority find a wave of sadness surrounding us. It can be hard to function normally, carry on conversations, laugh, or get involved with life in general. Depression can last a long time. I have a friend who ended up in the hospital after losing the battle of keeping her young cat alive. The degrees of depression depend on the person and what else they have in their lives. Eventually most people reach stage five – acceptance. With acceptance, the anger and the sadness begin to leave us and we are comforted by the many memories we hold in our hearts.

I will miss Pony – but when it is time, I will let him go.
